




A4 (Asian American Arts Alliance) and MoCADA (Museum of Contemporary African Diasporan Arts) Announce 2024 Bandung Residents



NEW YORK, June 25, 2024 – The Museum of Contemporary African Diasporan Arts and Asian American Arts Alliance are proud to announce the 2024 cohort of New York-based artists for the 3rd annual Bandung Residency, each selected for their ambitions to foster allyship between Asian American Pacific Islander and Black communities. This year's residency will support 9 projects by 11 participants, with two projects implemented by artist collectives or partnerships:

At a time of increasing attacks on racial minorities in the United States, the Residency takes inspiration from the historic 1955 Bandung Conference that gathered world leaders in pursuit of Afro-Asian solidarity.

This year's Residents will receive an honorarium, mentorship, conversations with community experts, and several workshops led by anti-oppression coach YK Hong. Throughout the residency period, the participating artists will host multiple community engagements leading to a public group presentation in 2025.

A book launch celebrating the process of creating the residency program and the projects of previous Bandung participants will take place at BRC Senior Services Center on Monday, July 15, 7:00–9:00pm.

"We're more ready than we've ever been to welcome a new cohort into this transformative community we've built of Bandung alumni and supporters.
